

Little International Livestock Expo Held at Penn State

Ronald C. Miller of State College captured the grand champion showmanship title with Jeffrey McKissick of Slippery Rock winning the reserve champion showman award in the 57th Little International Livestock Exposition April 27 at The Pennsylvania State University. The show was sponsored by the Block and Bridle Club.

In the beef cattle division, Mary Lou Altman of Greensburg was named both

champion fitter and reserve champion showman. Deborah M. Serecin of Alliquippa was the reserve champion fitter, with Dennis E. Stockdale of Dayton taking the champion beef showman award.

Ann Swinker of Brownsville was named champion horse showman, with Carol L. Rurnsey of Media winning both the reserve champion horse fitter and showman titles. Joan H. Hoffman of Allentown was named the

champion fitter in this area. From Bloomsburg, Susan Houston won the reserve champion sheep showman award, and Steven C. Pellman of Camp Hill was champion fitter. Ronald C. Miller of State College was both champion sheep

showman and reserve champion fitter. Champion swine showman honors were received by Jeffrey McKissick of Slippery Rock with the reserve champion showman title going to Randall R. Groff of State College. John F. Graeb

of Erie was the champion swine fitter with Karen L. Richard of Elysburg as the reserve champion fitter.

Other presentations made were to winners of the Intracollegiate Livestock Judging Contest held in conjunction with the Exposition and sponsored by the Penn State Block and Bridle Club. In the amateur division there was a championship tie between Michael P. Morris of Lansdowne and Jeffrey McKissick of Slippery Rock. Richard L. Beck, Jr. of Seven Valleys won the professional division. The newly instituted 4-H category was won by a Lancaster County 4-H Team with the high junior judge being Gregory Snyder from Lehigh County and high junior in oral reasons was Carl McCullough of Mercer County.

At the awards banquet following the Exposition, Elaine M. Palumbo of Sharon received a scholarship sponsored by the Block and Bridle Club for scholastic improvement. The club advisor, Professor Glenn R. Kean, was given

special recognition for his untiring support and leadership.

Dr. Grant W. Sherritt, swine coordinator and instructor at Penn State, was honored at the banquet for his contributions to and sincere interest in the welfare of the student body involved in agriculture. The Exposition was dedicated to Dr. Sherritt.

Edgar E. Fehnel, Vice President of Marketing Planning for Agricultural Products Worldwide, Elanco Products Company, Indianapolis, Ind., received the Distinguished Alumni Award from the Department of Animal Science.

More Soybean Funds Needed

Additional research funds are needed to increase soybean yields if the U.S. is to continue to meet increasing worldwide protein needs, according to the American Soybean Association (ASA).

In testimony before the U.S. House and Senate subcommittees investigating the needs for additional agricultural research funds, ASA said a relatively small investment in soybean research can result in benefits to consumers and farmers.

"By making a small investment in soybean research relative to the total importance of soybeans to the U.S., we can increase productivity, improve the standard of living throughout the world and improve our balance of payments," said Nick Rose, ASA spokesman.

The Agricultural Research Service is requesting Congress appropriate an additional \$1.4 million for soybean research. This additional money will be supplemented by \$1 million from soybean growers who support soybean research through their own contributions.

"Soybean production is in its infancy in relation to other U.S. crops," Rose said. "But soybeans have suddenly become the most important crop in terms of

cash returned to the farmer."

More efficient production and weed control are specific areas requiring further research, according to ASA testimony. The cost of producing a bushel of beans has risen 44 percent in the past year to \$3.60 a bushel.

Efficient machinery is one answer. "We must have machinery that is designed specifically for soybean production and handling," Rose said.

"At today's prices, soybean producers lose approximately \$900 million in soybeans that are grown to maturity, but to not reach the market because of inefficient combines and harvesting methods," he said.

Efficient herbicides are also needed. In 1972 weeds cost soybean farmers at least \$500 million in potential profits, according to ASA figures.

"Besides developing more efficient ways to raise soybeans and eliminate weeds, disease-resistant plants need to be developed or chemicals must be introduced that control the diseases," Rose pointed out.

Phytophthora root rot, brown stem rot, seedling diseases and others cause an estimated 12 percent reduction in production annually, or approximately \$1 billion per year.
