Pa. Broiler **Placements** Fall 6 pct.

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending April 27, 1974 were 1,144,000. The placements were 6 percent below the corresponding week a year earlier, and 19 percent below the previous week. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 2 percent below a year earlier.

Setting for broiler chicks were 1,917,000 - 10 percent below the previous week and 15 percent below the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 1 percent above the same period a year ago.

Inshipments of broiler-type chicks during the past 10 weeks averaged 2,000 compared with zero a year ago. Outshipments averaged 216,000 during the past 10 weeks, 15 percent below a year earlier.
