Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending May 4, 1974 were 1,320,000. The placements were 2 percent above the corresponding week a year earlier, and 15 percent above the previous week. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 3 percent below a year earlier.

Setting for broiler chicks were 2,129,000 - 11 percent above the previous week and 4 percent below the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 3 percent below the same period a year ago. Inshipments of broilertype chicks during the past 10 weeks averaged 2,000 compared with 1,000 a year ago. Outshipments averaged 232,000 during the past 10 weeks, 11 percent below a year earlier.

Placements in the 21 States were 63,211,000 approximately the same as the previous week and about the same as the corresponding week a year earlier. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were I percent above a year


