NEST RUN EGGS

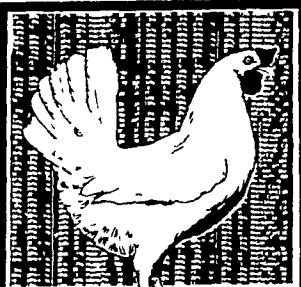

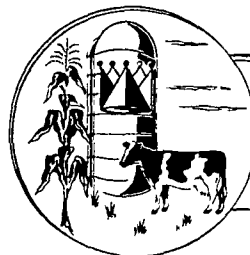
