Plants are still being shipped from nurseries by express or freight. 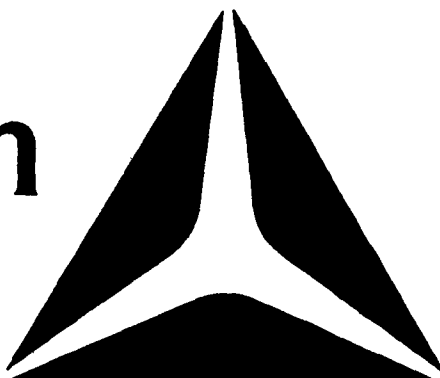

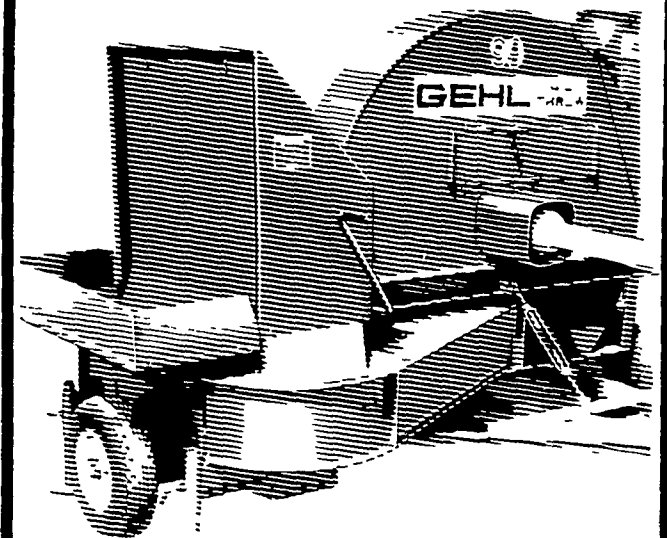
