

Plants are still being shipped from nurseries by express or freight. If plants that are shipped to you are badly dried upon arriving, plunge them into pails of luke-warm water or "heel them in" moist earth for a few days until ground conditions are right for planting,, suggest Extension horticulturists at The Pennsylvania State University.
