Act 515 is a measure which provides for lower tax rates for, landowners who agree to keep their land in open space for a specified number of years.

The constitutionality of Act 515 had been challenged in the courts some time ago. The challenge became a moot, issue in the 1973

with the passage of a consitiutional amendment permitting preferential tax treatment. This was the socalled Clean and Green amendment. Another preferential tax bill, HB 1056, is now being considered by the Pennsylvania Senate. Landowners will learn how to apply for tax relief, and they'll also be able to pick up application forms at the




