

Patriotic Drum Cake Sift together 4 cups sifted allpurpose flour, 4 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, ½ teaspoon ground mace and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Cream 1 cup butter or margarine and 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract. Add 2 cups sugar gradually. Beat until light and fluffy. Add 6 eggs one at a time, beating thoroughly after eash addition Add flour mixture alternately with 1 cup milk, beating until smooth. Pour into greased and floured 10 x 4-inch tube cake pan. Bake in preheated oven (325°F.) for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes. She urges you to note warnings on cosmetic labels and follow instructions carefully. If you believe you've been misled or injured by a cosmetic, report the facts to the nearest Food and Drug Administration office or to your local or state regulatory agency. Seek medical help if you need it. You should also save the rest of the product or container and report what happened to the packer or distributor. If you have a skin infection see your doctor. Don't rely on a cosmetic to cover it up.

Early in the season, clean the condenser and evaporator coils. To clean the evaporator, remove the decorative plastic front and the filter. Then vacuum clean the coil surface. To clean the condenser coil, run the vacuum cleaner brush attachment over the rear of the air conditioner. Be sure to turn off and unplug the unit before cleaning the coils.

Finally, keep blinds and curtains drawn during the hottest parts of the day, and keep doors and windows shut.
