Poultry Report For May

Pennsylvania produced 305 million eggs during May according to the Crop Reporting Service. This is 1 percent more than last month but 2 percent less than May 1973.

The May average of 14.5 million layers in flocks was 4 percent below last month's average and 2 percent below May 1973. Egg production per 100 layers during May totaled 2,105 eggs — up 4 percent from last month and 2 percent above a year earlier.

Nationally, the 5,705 million eggs produced during May was down 1 percent from May 1973. Layers on hand during May averaged 284 million, 2 percent below a year earlier. The average rate of lay during the month was up 1 percent from a year earlier.


