

Growing Degree Days

In Lancaster, the average temperature for the week was 69 degrees, 1 degree from the normal. Growing degree days for crops that start at 40 degrees totaled 1534, 128 more than the normal average.

For crops starting at 50 degrees, growing degree days totaled 810, 104 more than the average.

Rainfall for the week was 1.06 inches. Rainfall measured from April 1, was 10.36 inches, .73 inches more than the normal average.






