


Lancaster Farming, Saturday, June 29, 1974–19

Thirteen members attended the Busy Bakers Cooking Club June 25, 1974 at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Mt. Joy, Pa.


Following a short business meeting the Busy Bakers learned to make pudding and to bake brownies. They also made an orange sherbet punch.


