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NEST RUN EGGS

Prices are from Egg Clearinghouse, Inc., (ECI) Durham, N.H. and reflect trading prices for gradeable nest run eggs (GNR) on ECI, a nationwide trading center for producers, packers and marketers. GNR eggs are classified by weight in 30-dozen cases, and traded in lots of either 300 or 750 cases. Prices are FOB buyers dock, and are computed Tuesday and Thursday of each week. Cattle and calves compared with last week's close: Closing prices average -good to prime slaughter steers mostly 1.00 higher than late last week, instances 1.25-1.50 higher with much of advance on 1200-1300 pounds standard and low-good mainly Holsteins 1.50-2.00 higher. Heifers 75-1.00 higher. Cows 50-1.00 higher. Bulls fully steady.

Broiler-Fryer Market Wednesday, June 26

Ready to cook movement improving for current shipments as buyers attempt to increase inventories for advance needs prior to the holiday. Slaughter schedules fairly heavy at most plants. Today's less than trucklot asking prices generally unchanged to 1 cent higher on both plant and US Grade A. Advance interest good with early trading noted ranging 37-37½ cents on plant grade. Live supplies adequate though weights irregular. Undertone very firm.

Negotiated trucklot prices 2-3 lb. ready to cook broiler-fryers for delivery next week: US Grade A, none; Plant Grade 37-37½.

Pa. Broiler Placements Rise 15 pct.

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending June 22, 1974 were 1,330,000. The placements were 15 percent above the corresponding week a year earlier, and 6 percent below a year earlier.

Settings for broiler chicks were 1,952,000 - 6 percent above the previous week and 12 percent below the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 9 percent below the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 9 percent below the same period a year ago.

Inshipments of broiler-type chicks during the past 10 weeks averaged 1,000 compared with 1,000 a year ago. Outshipments averaged 275,000 during the past 10 weeks, 2 percent below a year earlier.

Placements in the 21 States were 60,544,000 - 2 percent below the previous week and 2 percent below the same week a year earlier. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 1 percent below a year ago.

Settings were 67,446,000 - 1 percent above the previous week and about the same as a year earlier.
