Prices are from Egg Clearinghouse, Inc., (ECI) Durham, N.H. and reflect trading prices for gradeable nest run eggs (GNR) on ECI, a nationwide trading center for producers, packers and marketers. GNR eggs are classified by weight in 30-dozen cases, and traded in lots of either 300 or 750 cases. Prices are FOB buyers dock, and are computed Tuesday and Thursday of each week. 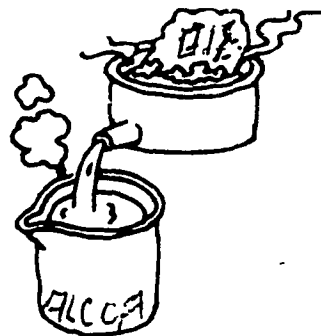

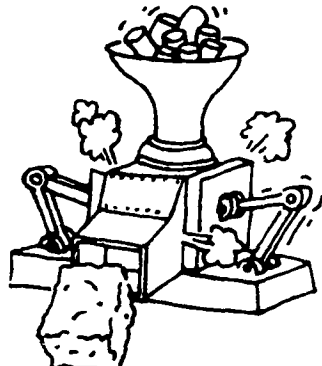

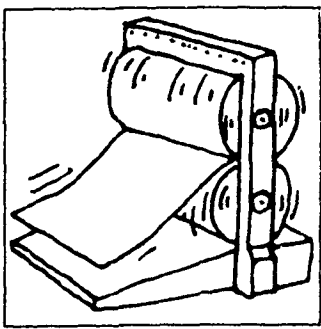

Pa. Broiler Placements Up 9 pct.

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending July 6, 1974 were 1,251,000. The placements were 9 percent above the corresponding week a year earlier and 6 percent below the previous week. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 1 percent above a year earlier.

Settings for broiler chicks were 1,847,000 - 7 percent below the previous week and 5 percent below the comparable period a year ago.

Inshipments of broiler-type chicks during the past 10 weeks averaged 1,000 compared with 1,000 a year ago. Outshipments averaged 277,000 during the past 10 weeks, 6 percent below a year earlier.

Placements in the 21 States were 53,992,000 - 10 percent below the previous week and 1 percent below the same week a year earlier. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 3 percent below a year ago.

Settings were 66,916,000 - 2 percent below the previous week and 5 percent below a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 3 percent below the comparable period a year ago.

Broiler-Fryer Market
Wednesday, July 10

Ready to cook movement very light and disappointing as buyers take a wait and see attitude while awaiting further market conditions. Slaughter schedules again reduced at most plants. Today's less than trucklot asking prices ranged 2-3 cents lowers on both plant and US Grade A. Early trading for next week noted at 33 cents on Plant Grade. Live supplies ample though weights still desirable as extreme heat tends to retard growth. Undertone very unsettled.

Negotiated trucklot prices 2-3 lb. ready to cook broiler-fryers for delivery next week: US Grade A none; Plant Grade 33.

Current broiler-fryer negotiated prices for immediate delivery mostly multiple drop shipments to New York City from Delmarva:
