York Co. 4-H Livestock Judges

The York County 4-H Livestock Judging Contest was held at the Warrington Green Farms, Wellsville, owned by Dr. & Mrs. George Kushner. The contest facilities were made ready by George Dutrey, manager of Warrington Green Farms. There were nine counties present with 75 4-H members participating.

The winners of the Junior contest were Lisa Dobrosky,

RD2 Glen Rock with a score of 283 points out of a possible 300 points. Tim Beck, RD2 Seven Valleys was ninth place with a score of 266 points.

The winning team of the contest was York with 1205 points composed of Nat Sheffer, RD3 Hanover; Terry Dixon, RD1 Hellam Br., York; and Kathy Sunday, RD1 York.

Nat Sheffer was 4th place

in beef cattle judging and Terry Dixon was 5th. Kathy Sunday was 5th place in sheep judging. Nat Sheffer was 3rd high individual in the contest with a score of 405 points. Terry Dixon was 4th with 403 points and Kathy Sunday was 10th with 397 points.

Thought For Food



Tuna-Vegetable Melange Salad
Cook 1 package (10 oz.) frozen mixed vegetables and 1 package (10 oz.) frozen cauliflower according to package directions. Drain and chill. In a bowl, combine mixed vegetables, cauliflower, 1 cup thinly sliced celery and 1/4 cup finely chopped onion; set aside. Mix 6 tablespoons salad oil, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon sugar and 1/16 teaspoon hot pepper sauce. Pour over vegetable mixture. Cover and refrigerate one hour. Just before serving add 2 cans (7 oz. each) tuna fish, drained and chunked. Arrange vegetables and tuna as desired on large lettuce lined platter. Yields six portions.

Study Hunter Safety By Mail

Parents of children who will be securing their first hunting license for the 1974-75 hunting season will be interested to know that through the cooperative efforts of the Pennsylvania Game Commission and Penn State University, a correspondence course on Hunter Safety Education has been developed.

The course was planned to aid and supplement the instruction the young hunter will receive when completing the mandatory hunter-safety program presently administered by the Pennsylvania Game Commission. Citizens of 18 of our states and four Canadian provinces, having similar mandatory hunter-safety

programs as Pennsylvania, will find the course to be of value to their young and first-time hunters.

The course is broader, however, than most literature on the subject of hunter-safety as the topics of hunter-land owner relations, survival, archery, hunting ethics, respect for land and wildlife, and knowledge of sporting arms and ammunition are also discussed.
