The winner is to represent Lancaster County at the State 4-H Days at Penn State next month Nolt, however, declined to make the journey leaving Rohrer to represent the county.

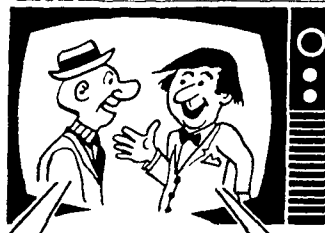
Jay Irwin, assistant county agent, noted that both boys "did an excellent job handling the tractors."
