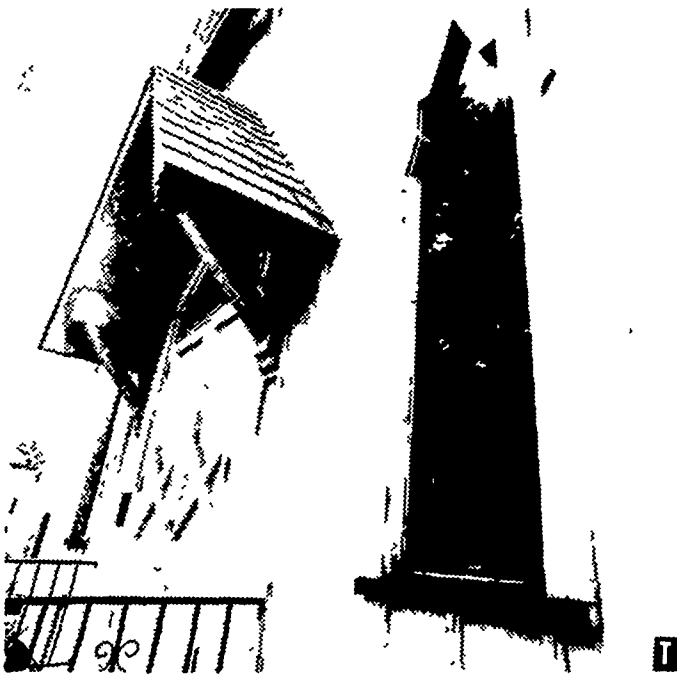

One place where it's uniquely being used is on the windows of Trinity Episcopal Church in Jefferson, Ohio. A little piece of clear, practically impervious plastic, can provide a lot of protection for places with stained glass and plenty of other windows. And it does all this without marring the appearance of the window or spoiling the view, as glass embedded with wire mesh or screening would
