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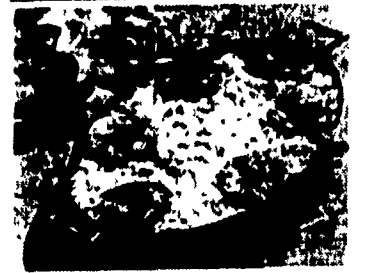
Historical Turning Point

Thought For Food



Scrambled Eggs And Tomatoes
Beat one dozen eggs in a large mixing bowl; add 1 cup milk, ½ teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon aromatic bitters and ¼ teaspoon pepper. Melt 2 tablespoons butter in skillet, pour in egg mixture. Cook over low heat, stirring frequently, until eggs are just firm. Top with slices of tomato, garnish with mushroom slices. Put under broiler until tomatoes are lightly browned. Yields 6 to 8 servings.

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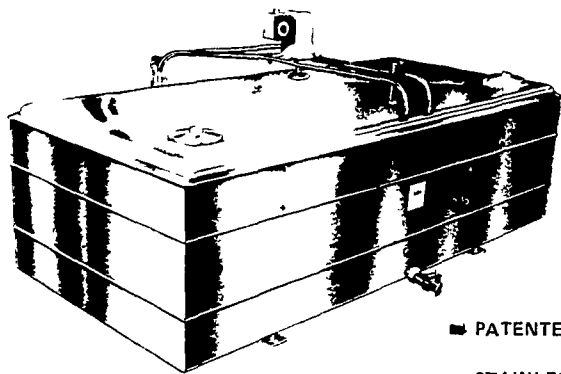
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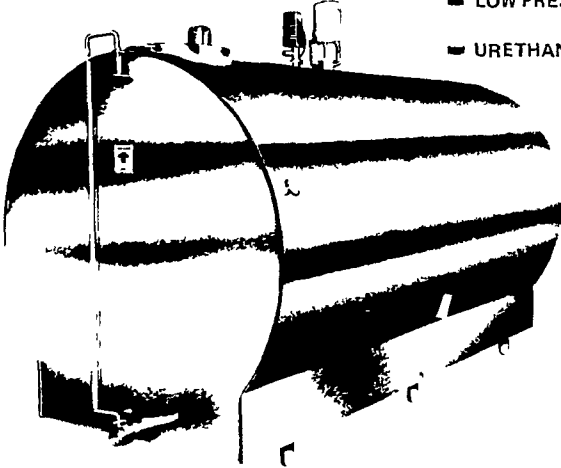
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
