NEPPCO Convention Theme Announced

The theme selected for the 1974 NEPPCO Convention to be held in the Benjamin Franklin Hotel, Philadelphia, Pa., on October 21 & 22, is "Revolutionary Concepts."

According to Frank Baber, program chairman, the theme is a combination of the historic site of the Convention one block from

Independence Hall, the start this year of our Nations' Bicentennial Celebration, and a significant address at last year's NEPPCO Convention by Dr. L. M. Skamser of the American Cyanamid Company titled, "Radicalism: An Approach for the American Poultry Industry".

Dr. Skamser defined radicalism as, "movement away from the usual or traditional," and made a strong plea for the poultry industry to embrace this concept.

"We feel the 1974 NEPPCO Convention should be a movement away from the usual or traditional," declared Chairman Baber, "and since radical and revolutionary are by one definition synonymous, we felt our theme, 'Revolutionary Concepts' would connote both radicalism and the historic panorama of Philadelphia, the Liberty Bell, the Declaration of Independence, the American Revolution and the birth of our Nation."

The fact that there will be no exhibits at this year's NEPPCO Convention is one "movement away from the usual or traditional". But this promises to be a healthy change, says Baber, because it permits the staff and committees to focus all their efforts on providing an arena wherein the producer can

listen, learn, discuss, exchange ideas and, hopefully, find solutions to the difficult problems facing him today.

The program is now being completed, Mr. Baber said, and will be announced shortly. It will start with a keynote luncheon on Monday, October 21, and conclude with a gala banquet and party, Tuesday evening, October 22. Monday evening, October 21, will be open for suppliers who plan to host customers and prospects in hospitality suites as well as at private dinners, shows and nite clubs. A separate program of entertainment and cultural interest for the ladies is also being planned.

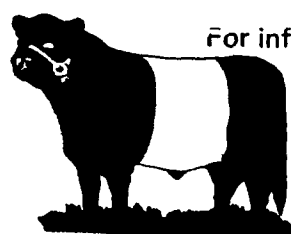
