Routine Washer Care

Turn off hot and cold water faucets to prevent strain on the hoses cuased by water pressure after finishing washing. Check to see that hoses are not kinked or bent.

Clean washer lint filter after using. Wipe the inside of the tub and agitator with a clean damp cloth or sponge as routine care. To remove the agitator, turn the cap to the left (counterclockwise). Lift out the agitator, check the bottom of the tub and remove any objects that may have dropped out of pockets. Wipe the agitator post before replacing the agitator, then secure the cap tightly in position.


