## Dairy Replacement Price Report

SUMMARY FOR AUGUST, 1974

There were approximately 490 dairy replacement cattle reported on of which an estimated 405 head were native (Pennsylvania) and 85 head were imported. This compared with a total of 480 head for July, 1974.

Compared with the July, 1974 report, the market was slow to Moderate. Cows were highly uneven, \$125 higher to \$175 lower. Heifers were uneven to mostly \$25 higher.


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
