Holly, Elizabeth, and Sarah will receive expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, December 1-5. Joan is recipient of a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond and will be eligible to attend the national conference. All five will compete for awards at the national level.

Dr. Robert B. Lewis, leadership development specialist, 4-H Youth, at The Pennsylvania State University, who announced the award selections, said they were judged on the basis of project work, leadership ability, and participation in county and state activities.
