Flood Checks Released To Non-Profit Groups

The release of checks September, 1971 and June, totaling \$1,436,760 to nonprofit organizations which suffered damage during the floods of September, 1971 and June, 1972 was announced today by Governor Milton J. Shapp.

The payments made today went to 32 of the 140 applicants for the program. All remaining checks will be mailed out by the end of November.

The \$5 million program, known as Act 159, was passed by the General Assembly and signed into law by Shapp last January. It authorizes state aid to nonprofit organizations damaged in the floods of

"This is part of the state's continuing effort to do everything we can for the people and organizations who suffered in the floods," Shapp said.


