Corn Production Up 3 Percent

Corn for grain production yield last year was 210 cwt. in Pennsylvania, estimated November 1 by the Crop Reporting Service, is expected to total 83,400,000 bushels, three percent more than last year's production. Yield per acre is expected to be 78 bushels, the same as last year.

Production of soybeans for beans is expected to total 1,690,000 bushesl, 18 percent more than last year. Yield per acre is expected to be 26 bushels, the same as last year's yield.

Fall potato production in Pennsylvania is estimated to total 7,920,000 cwt. (hundredweight) and yield is expected to average 240 cwt. per acre. The 1974 estimate is 26 percent more than last year's production. Average decrease of 5 percent from

per acre.

Pennsylvania seedleaf tobacco production is expected to total 24.7 million pounds, with yield per acre averaging 1,900 pounds. Last year's tobacco production was 22.1 million pounds with a yield of 1,700 pounds per

Pennsylvania's fresh market sweet corn harvest was estimated to be 660,000 cwt. this year, an increase of 1 percent from last year's harvest. Average yield is estimated to be the same this year as last-55 cwt. per acre. Value of the corn produced is estimated to be \$5.4 million.

Fresh market tomato production in Pennsylvania totaled 210,000 cwt., a

last year: Yield averaged 100 cwt. per acre, the same as last year. The crop has estimated value of \$3.9 million.

Pennsylvania's commerical cabbage crop was 323,000 cwt., the same as last year's production. Average and yields remained the same as a year ago.

Fresh market snap bean harvest totaled 39,000 cwt. this year, compared with 37,000 cwt. last year. Acreage harvested was 5 percent less than last year, but yield was 55 cwt. per acre compared with 50 cwt. last year. Total value of the crop increased 17 percent to \$725,000.

Production of corn for grain in the United States is forecast at 4,621 million bushels, a 2 percent drop from the October forecast, 18 percent less than last year and 17 percent below 1972. Average yield is now forecast at 72.5 bushels per acre, a 1.5 bushel reduction from October and nearly 19 bushels below the 91.4 bushels yield last year. Acreage for grain harvest, at 63.7 million bushels is unchanged from the October 1 estimate but 3 percent above last year.

Production of sorghum for grain is forecast at 609 million bushels, reduction of 4 percent from last month and 35 percent below last уеаг.

Soybean production, placed at 1,244 million bushels, declined 1 percent from last month's forecast.

Production of all tobacco is forecast at 1,963 million pounds, 13 percent larger than the 1973 output of 1,743 million pounds. All cigar tobacco is expected to total 59.6 million pounds, up 4 percent from the 1973 production of 57.1 million pounds.

Production for the fall crop of potatoes is forecast at a record 287.9 million cwt., up 13 percent from the 253.9 million cwt. harvested in 1973 and slightly above the October 1 forecast.
