

Elmer Hawbecker Gets PFA Award

D. Elmer Hawbecker, former state senator and a dairyman from Franklin County, last night was presented the distinguished service award of the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association (PFA) at the group's annual awards banquet. The affair was part of the 24th annual meeting last week in Camp Hill of that farm organization, which will close today with the adoption of 1975 policies and the election of officers. PFA is a general farm organization with more than 19,000 family members, and has 52 county associations affiliated with the statewide

group. It is also affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The Berks County Farmers' Association took the top award for the best overall program, being designated the all-star county. William Myers president of the Berks Association, accepted the award along with taking first place honors in four other individual program areas.

Elmer Hawbecker was honored with the organization's distinguished service award for his "outstanding leadership in the agriculture community." The former state senator

served for a number of years on the Senate Agriculture committee and was a member of PFA's Board of Directors.

Some 20 program awards were presented at the banquet for individual program areas and overall programs for the different county associations.

Berks County Association—All-Star County; first place in the over 400 member category in overall program, commodity activities, women's committee and organizational structure.

Adams County Association—second place in the over 400 member category in overall program; first place for national legislation and political education.

Lehigh County Association—second place in the 201-400 member category in overall program.

Cambria County Association—first place in the under 200 member

category for overall program.

Luzerne County Association—second place in the under 200 member category for overall program.

Mercer County Association—first place for advisory councils, information and policy development.

Cumberland County Association—first place for Farm Management and Business Analysis Service.

Franklin County Association—first place for insurance.

Butler County Association—first place for membership attainment.

Armstrong County Association—first place for state legislation.

Erie County Association—first place for marketing activities.

PennAg Directors Discuss Impact of New Pesticide Law

Henry F. Nixon, Director, Bureau of Plant Industry of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, spoke to the board of directors of PennAg Industries Association in Harrisburg recently about the state's new pesticide law.

The pesticide law, which will be administered by Nixon's bureau, will implement at a state level, federal pesticide laws which regulate the application of pesticides according to their potency and effectiveness.

The Bureau of Plant Industry is now drafting regulations that will attempt to regulate application of the pesticides. Under the regulations, everyone who uses restricted pesticides will have to be certified by the state.

Nixon told the PennAg

directors that Penn State is setting up a program to train private and commercial applicators. Certification will be given upon passing a certification exam. The program will be fully implemented by 1976.

The bureau cannot implement the program or make a final draft until they are given a list of the affected pesticides by The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Until this list is released, manufacturers and blenders say they'll have a hard time planning their products. Lawn and garden manufacturers would not want to put restricted pesticides in their products.

PennAg, for example, will be setting up training sessions for its state-wide membership and giving out information.
