# Report From Pa. Jr. Holstein Meet

The annual business meeting was held Friday, November 22. Under old business, a resolution to change the bylaws which was presented last year was voted on and passed. It reads as follows:

1. At the Annual Meeting of the Pennsylvania Jr. Holstein Ass'n. caucuses of each convention district, as defined in Article IX, will elect two Jr. Executive Committee members from their district. Terms of Jr. Executive Committee members will be one year. Jr. Executive Committee members will be eligible to serve only two terms.

2. The Junior Executive Committee will, at a reorganizational meeting immediately following their election at the annual meeting, elect officers as terested in becoming a provided for in Article VII. 
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
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
