#### OLD FARMER'S WEATHER FORECASTS

New England: First part of week rainy; some clearing and much colder with intermittent light snow latter part. Gre ter New York-New Jersey: Rain to start, then turning cola; end of week cloudy and raw with light rain.

Central Great Plains: Week begins partly sunny, then mild in west and light rain or snow in east; end of week fair in west and light rain or snow in east.

Texas-Oklahoma: First part of week mostly sunny and warm in central and south, and light snow changing to rain in north; partly sunny and mild latter part.

Rocky Mountain Region: Occasional flurries or light rain to midweek, then clearing and mild; end of week clear and mild. Southwest Desert: Cold and frosty at first, then clearing and warming; mostly sunny and warm latter part.

Pacific Northwest: Rain and drizzle all week; some rain mixed with snow in north latter part.

California: Cloudy and cool with light rain all weel in north;
