The Champion crossbred steer was shown by Douglas Hoover, Lancaster County with Gary Eberly's steer placing as reserve champion.


Bernie Gish, also of Lancaster County showed the champion Hereford steer with Lucy Brubaker of Lancaster taking reserve honors with her animal.


