Limes Spark Holiday Foods

Limes are a tart and tangy addition to the holiday season. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) estimates that the supply of limes - mostly from Florida, California, and Mexico - will be adequate to meet consumer requirements this year.

Fresh limes from Florida, where most of the U.S. commercial crop is grown, are marketed under a federal marketing order.

Regulations under the marketing order require all Florida lime shipments to meet minimum size and juice content requirements. Since many limes are used for juice, the minimum 42-percent juice content requirement keeps un-

desirable (low-juice) fruit off the market.

In most instances, low-juice limes are immature. The regulation merely delays harvesting since such limes will achieve the required juice content if left on the tree.

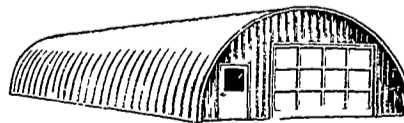
