## Seven Master Farmers Named

Seven rural Pennsylvanians were honored as Master Farmers today at a special Farm Show Week luncheon of state agricultural leaders at the Penn Harris Motor Inn.

The seven new Master Farmers won recognition for leadership in farm and civic organizations as well as achievements in agriculture.

Those receiving the coveted award were: Charles N. Dodd, Route 2, Corry, Warren County; Wayne and Harold Leshner, Route 1, Bernville, Berks County; Gerald Parker, Star Route, Liberty, Tioga County; Charles R. Phillips, Box 5, Pillow, Dauphin County; William H. Ringler, Route 1, Berlin, Somerset County; and Richard B. Trostel, Route 1, Biglerville, Adams County.

Charles Dodd is a dairyman in partnership with his father, Leslie, also a Master Farmer, and farms over 1100 acres and milks 257 cows. All milk is sold at their attractive farm retail store.

Wayne and Harold Leshner likewise are dairymen and earned the Master Farmer award as a partnership. The two brothers farm 675 acres

and milk 141 cows. They sell their milk direct to consumers from their own retail farm store.

Still another dairyman, Gerald Parker, doesn't believe in putting all his eggs in one basket, however, and has diversified his farm operation with laying hens. Both are a commercial venture in their own right - some 80 milk cows and 18,000 laying hens.

Poultryman Charles Phillips specializes in game birds - pheasants and chukar partridges. He sells some 40,000 mature birds each year either live to shooting preserves or as dressed game birds.

William Ringler, a dairyman and potato grower, operates a farm that's been in the family over 200 years. Crops are spread over 450 acres with 55 dairy cows in the milking string. He farms in partnership with his son, Jim.

The only fruit grower in this year's class of Master Farmers, Richard Trostel, has 200 acres of apple, cherry, peach, pear and plum orchards. An innovator, Trostel was one of the first to use dwarf fruit trees and introduced trickle irrigation in Pennsylvania orchards.

The annual Master Farmer Awards Program is cosponsored by the Penn-

sylvanian Farmer magazine and the Penn State Cooperative Extension Service.

Judges for the contest this year were: James A. McHale, Secretary of Agriculture, Harrisburg; Dr. James M. Beattie, Dean of the College of Agriculture, Penn State, State College; and Merrill M. Mordan, Chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the Pennsylvania Bankers Association, Honey Brook.

Winners this year were selected from more than 160 nominations.

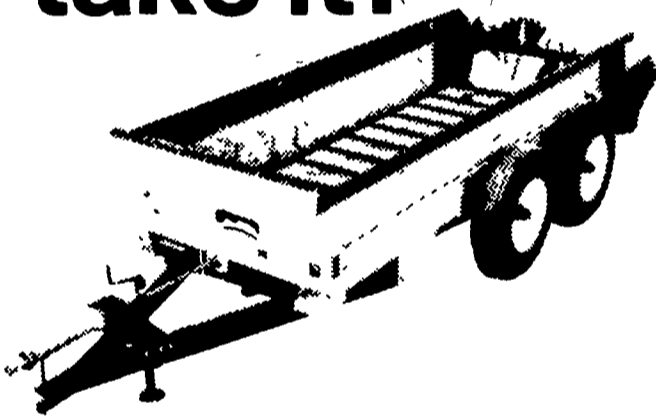
## Mays' Win Entomology Competition
