
Rohrer is Farm Show Tobacco Champion

Holstein Group To Hold Sales

Association has announced plans for one of the country's major Holstein events of 1975. Involved are two consignment sales and the State Holstein Show on April 17, 18, and 19. All events are scheduled for the Farm Building Show in Harrisburg.

The schedule is as follows: Thursday, April 17 - Pa. State Calf Sale; Friday, April 18 - Pa. State Cow & Bred Heifer Sale; Saturday, April 19 - Pa. State Holstein Show.

The Calf Sale is an annual event with 200 head of Registered Holstein calves under one year old to be sold at auction. A new sales series starts in 1975 with the Cow & Bred Heifer Sale. It is anticipated that nearly 200 head will be consigned by breeders of Registered Holsteins in Pennsylvania. In addition to the females, plans also call for the sale of 10-12 Holstein bulls on Friday.
