

Local Dairymen Take Prizes At Farm Show

Dairymen in the five-county area served by Lancaster Farming managed to capture some top prizes in all but the Guernsey competition at the Pennsylvania Farm Show. Brown Swiss

For the second year in a row, Donald Trimble, Peach Bottom, Lancaster County, showed one of his Donsdell Farms cows to the breed championship at the Farm Show. Donsdell Stretchy Carol, a three-year-old, was also judged senior champion.

Reserve grand champion honors went to "Sunnyvaler Flipper," a 7-year-old cow

owned by J. E. and R. O. Snelling, of Birchrunville, Chester County.

Harry L. Leininger, of Ephrata, Lancaster County, captured the junior championship with "Leininger Beautician," a senior yearling.

Another Snelling entry, "Snelling Design Hone," a junior yearling, won the reserve junior championship.

Snelling also won premier breeder and premier exhibitor awards.

Holsteins
Paul Miller, of Linglestown, Dauphin County, showing "Fran-Mar-Co Appollo C," a 4-year-old, walked off with grand championship honors in Holstein judging competition at the 59th Farm Show. The same animal earlier was judged senior champion. Miller is the father of Deborah Miller who currently reigns as State Dairy Princess.

"Huntsdale Paula Blacky," a 3-year-old Holstein, exhibited by Meryl H. Sheaffer, of Carlisle,

Cumberland County, won the reserve grand and reserve senior championships.

The junior champion, "Woodbine Ideal Pride," a senior yearling, was shown by James P. Knight, of RD2, Airville, York County.

J and A. Foster, of Petersburg, Huntingdon County, exhibited the reserve junior champion, "Globe Run Capsule," a senior yearling.

Premier exhibitor and premier breeder awards went to George Knight and Family, of RD2, Airville, York County.

Linda Kauffman, of Elizabethtown, Lancaster County, for the second straight year, captured the championship in junior Holstein classes. This year she won with "C. Mount Haven Ideal," a 6-year-old. She is a member of the Lancaster County 4-H Dairy Club.

Reserve championship honors went to George M. Knight, III, of RD2, Airville, York County, showing his 2-year-old cows, "Woodbine Ivanhoe Fan." George is a

member of the Milk and Money 4-H Dairy Club.

Jersey
Walebe Farms, Inc., of Collegeville, Montgomery County, captured three of six championships in Jersey open class judging competition at the 59th Farm Show.

Walebe Farms entries captured the grand championship with "Walebe Favorite Lily," a 3-year-old. The same animal also was judged senior champion. Their other winner was "Walebe T Kelly Sleeper," a senior yearling that won the junior championship.

Reserve grand and reserve senior championship honors went to "W. A. Advancer Sleeper," a 2-year-old cow exhibited by Stephens Brothers, of Honesdale, Wayne County.

Beth Hemminger, of Carlisle, Cumberland County, won the reserve junior championship with "Huntsdale Sparkie Generator," a junior yearling.

Walebe Farms won both premier breeder and premier exhibitor awards.

Cynthia Ann Waltemyer, of Collegeville, Montgomery County, showing "Walebe Milestone Nar," a 6-year-old cow, won the championship in Jersey youth classes at the 59th Farm Show.

Reserve champion honors went to "Top-O-Hill Vedas Mis," a 2-year-old, owned by Bruce A. Heller, of Downingtown, Chester County.

Cynthia Ann is a member of the Keystone 4-H Dairy Club and Bruce belongs to the Chester Valley 4-H Dairy Club.

Milking Shorthorn
James H. Young, of Newville, Cumberland County, showing "Green-vista Supp Peggy," a 4-year-old, won the grand cham-

pionship in Milking Shorthorn judging competition at the 59th Farm Show. The same animal was earlier judged senior champion.

"Pinesedge Melody ESP," a 3-year-old, owned by Samuel G. Yoder, of Shoemakersville, Berks County, won the reserve grand and reserve senior championships.

James H. Young also showed the junior champion, "The Springs TFPPA," a heifer calf.

The reserve junior championship was won by "Pinesedge Cherry 14T," a heifer calf exhibited by Wendy Yoder, of Shoemakersville.

Samuel G. Yoder was winner of premier exhibitor and premier breeder awards.

Nedra J. Yoder, of Shoemakersville, Berks County, showing "Pinesedge Kings Car," a 4-year-old, won the Milking Shorthorn youth championship at the 59th Farm Show.

Nedra's sister, Wendy, won the reserve championship with "Pinesedge Cherry 14T," a heifer calf. Both are members of the Northern Berks County 4-H Club.

Ayrshire
William Ocker, of Shippensburg, Cumberland County, and Kennard E. Henley, III, of Cochranville, Chester County, two 4-H members, captured all championships in Ayrshire female classes at the 59th Farm Show.

The grand and senior championship was won by an Ocker entry, "Masonic Homes Flashy," a 5-year-old cow. Another Ocker cow, a 3-year-old, "Harriet Super Holly," was judged reserve grand champion and reserve senior champion.

Kennard Henley won both junior titles in open class judging. "Towerview Kellys SM," a junior yearling was judged junior champion, and the reserve junior champion was "Towerview Flashy Minerva," a senior yearling.

John E. Ocker and Family, of Shippensburg, won both the premier exhibitor and

premier breeder awards. "Masonic Homes Flashy," a William Ocker 5-year-old cow that captured the grand championship in open Ayrshire classes at the 59th Farm Show, also won the grand championship in junior classes. William is a member of the Cumberland County 4-H Dairy Club.

Kennard Henley's 9-year-old Ayrshire, "Androssan GLR Minerva," captured the reserve championship in junior classes. Kennard is a member of the Manor 4-H Dairy Club.

Farmers Need Complete Records

Farmers must keep complete records—so they won't overlook investment credit eligibility, depreciation expenses, and deductible items like farm magazines, farm organization dues, bank service charges, utility bills on the part of the house used for a farm office, overnight business trips, food eaten by hired help, and money spent to board hired workers, remind Extension farm management specialists at The Pennsylvania State University.

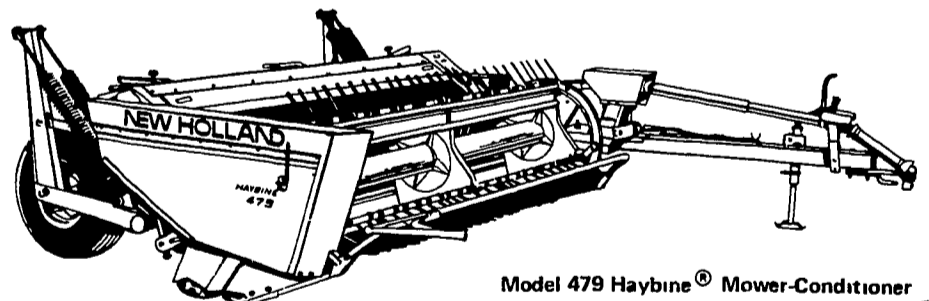

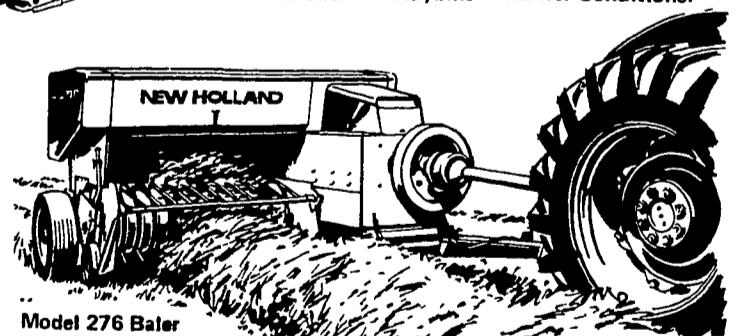
