When we switched over, a few months ago, we brought in four times as many birds, but the work really takes just about the same amount of time. And it's a lot easier." As she spoke, Norma was working at a table full of eggs, most of which went all the way from the chicken to the refrigerated cooler without once being touched by human hands.

Norma manages the triple-

packing chore.

Every morning from 8:30 to 10:30, Norma's at the packer, watching the eggs go through at the rate of 50 cases per hour. In the afternoon, she's there from 2:30 to 3:30 again, picking out the cracks, watching for trouble, keeping the machine flowing smoothly. Under her watchful eye, mechanical marvel packs up to 40,000 eggs a day.

Conveyed gently from the cages by a moving belt that runs the length of the building, the eggs go onto a moving ladder to be lifted one flight up onto the belt of the packer. There, they're fed automatically onto rollers, grasped gently by metal fingers and placed into flats. The flats leave the packer, go onto another belt. where they're stacked, by hand, by Craig. The flats are placed onto wheeled dollies and moved into a cooled storage room for pickup the next morning by a driver from Victor F. Weaver, Inc.
