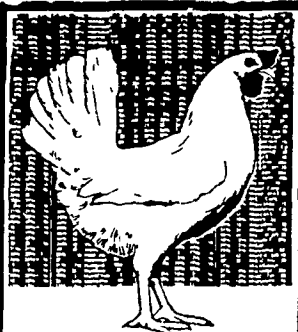
NEST RUN EGGS

Prices are from Egg Clearinghouse, Inc., (ECI) Durham, N.H. and reflect trading prices for gradeable nest run eggs (GNR) on ECI, a nationwide trading center for producers, packers and marketers. GNR eggs are classified by weight in 30-dozen cases, and traded in lots of either 300 or 750 cases. Prices are FOB buyers dock, and are computed Tuesday and Thursday of each week. Ready to cook movement continues fairly good. Slaughter schedules fairly heavy though occasional plant not operating today. Today's less than trucklot asking prices held unchanged on both plant and US Grade A. Advance interest fair though unaggressive with no confirmed trading reported. Live supplies adequate at mostly desirable weights. Undertone fully steady.

Current broiler-fryer negotiated prices for immediate delivery mostly multiple-drop shipments to New York City from Delmarva.
