Fluorscent Light Damages Milk Quality

Homogenized milk in its flavor and nutrient value fiberboard containers holds better than milk in plastic

The fiberboard protected milk from off-flavors created by fluorescent light up to 48 hours in the experiments. However, milk in plastic and glass containers developed off-flavors after 12 hours of exposure to light in dairy display cases, according to Dr. Paul S. Dimick, associate professor of food science at Penn State.

Riboflavin, one of the growth-promoting B vitamins, remained quite stable in fiberboard containers throughout the study. However, riboflavin in milk stored in glass and plastic decreased after 48 hours on the shelf exposed to fluorescent light. Riboflavin content also remained intact in milk stored in stainless steel cans as a comparison product.

The average riboflavin content in milk is nearly 1.6 milligrams per quart. Thus, one quart of milk daily will supply 98 per cent of the Recommended Daily Dietary Allowance. It was calculated that dairy products in 1973 contributed almost 42 per cent of the total riboflavin consumed in the United States.

Vitamin C or ascorbic acid decreased rapidly in milk stored in glass and plastic up to 48 hours. Thereafter, the vitamin C content remained at about 10 per cent of the original level through 144 hours, the total length of the study. Vitamin C in the fiberboard containers also decreased but only to about 16 per cent of the original level throughout the 144 hours.

Analyses by Dr. Dimick and associates confirmed earlier findings in a Penn State survey which showed that oxidized off-flavors can be traced to flavorescent lights used in daily display cases. The current findings reinforce present thinking that milk should be protected from light during marketing to assure flavor quality and nutrient value.

Average light transmission for the three types of milk containers was 2.8 per cent for fiberboard, 69.2 per cent for plastic, and 90.7 per cent for glass. All the milks in the experiment were stored at 45 degrees Fahrenheit. Milk samples in display cases were subjected to 100 foot-candles of fluorescent light.

Amino acids, compounds that form proteins, are among the nutrients found in milk. There were no appreciable changes in amino acid content in the study, with milk stored under lights equal to comparison milk in cans.
