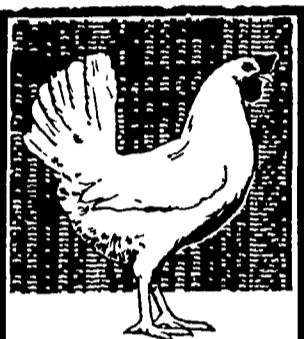
New Holland Horse

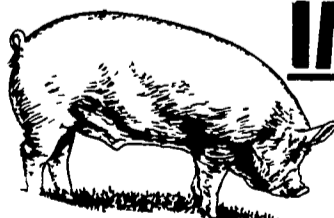
