### **ASA Approves** Soybean Production

Amid the debate about organized reduction in planting acreage for corn and soybeans, the American Soybean Association (ASA) this week reaffirmed its policy of taking positive action to create demand rather than the negative action of reducing produc-

Ralph Jackson, executive vice president of the Hudsonbased organization, said that immediately seek additional

ASA has been working for the past 19 years to create demand for soybeans by operating a vigorous overseas market development program.

"Should ASA officially or unofficially sanction a reduction of soybean acreage," he said, "our foreign customers would react with predictable horror. Many of them would supplies of rapeseed, sunflower, palm oil, coconut oil, fishmeal or Brazilian soybeans."

Noting that about half of the United States soybean production is exported, Jackson added, "Fifty per cent of our market would suffer irreparable harm."

Emphasizing that planting decisions are individual choices made by each farmer on the basis of economics, Jackson said ASA would neither tell farmers to plant soybeans "from fence row to fence row" nor ask them to reduce acreage.

"There is a possibility that an organized effort to reduce acreage could backfire and result in increased production," he said. "If farmers think everyone else is reducing acreage, they

may increase their own acreage to take advantage of the expected price increase.

The ASA official also said that, through ASA efforts in Washington, monitoring of soybean exports may soon be abolished.

However, he said, an organized effort to reduce soybean acreage would 'certainly result in delay on this matter, and possibly cause tightening of present controls.'

Jackson said ASA adopted its policy of taking positive action to create demand rather than recommending acreage reductions several years ago.

"Past experience proves that the policy is sound and is working in the best interest of all soybean farmers," he said. "Unlike other major crops, soybeans have never been under acreage controls, nor has soybean production ever been subsidized by government incentive payments.

"It is imperative that we maintain that policy even in the face of adversity."
