

## **Tobacco Crop Exported**

With U.S. tobacco exports setting an all-time record of \$1.2 billion in 1974, Maryland's unique Type-32 leaf, a light air-cured species, accounted for \$13,717,000 for that foreign trade figure.

of Agriculture, quoting as compared with 9.5 million pounds for 1973.

A comparison of the three largest overseas markets shows that Switzerland and Belgium - Luxembourg increased purchases by 9 and 44 percent respectively, while shipments to West Germany were down by 14 percent.

The top quality Maryland tobacco, representing about 40 percent of the total crop, is sold abroad, with Switzerland traditionally purchasing about half of the state's exports.

No shipments were made to Canada or the Latin American countries last year, though in the past those countries have purchased some quantities. In 1974, Spain, Portugal and Australia were among the importers of the Maryland leaf.

Maryland tobacco is prized for its superior quality, flavor and clean burning characteristics. Domestically, only a small portion of Type-32 is mixed with other cigarette tobaccos. In Switzerland, a much higher percentage of

the Maryland plant is incorporated in the blends cigarette used by manufacturers there.


Maryland farmers in St. Mary's, Charles, Prince Georges, Calvert and Anne The Maryland Department Arundel Counties produced 28,800,000 pounds of tobacco USDA sources, reports that last year. Though that crop last year Maryland tobacco will not be sold until late exports registered a 13.4 spring, the yield has an percent increase over the estimated value of over \$28 previous year, to reach a million, according to the total of 10.9 million pounds, Maryland Crop Reporting Service.

> Once the state's most valuable field crop, tobacco now ranks third in dollar

value, behind corn and soybeans. The 1974 crop will be sold at the loose-leaf auctions held at Wayson's Corner, Upper Mariboro, Waldorf and Hughesville, beginning in the middle of April.


