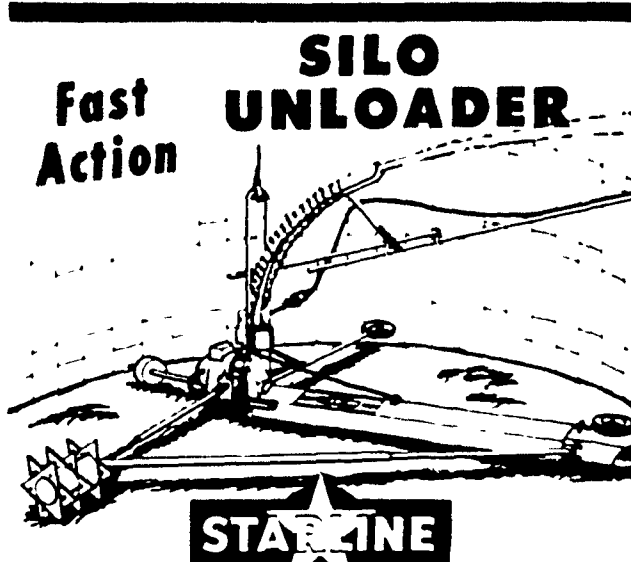

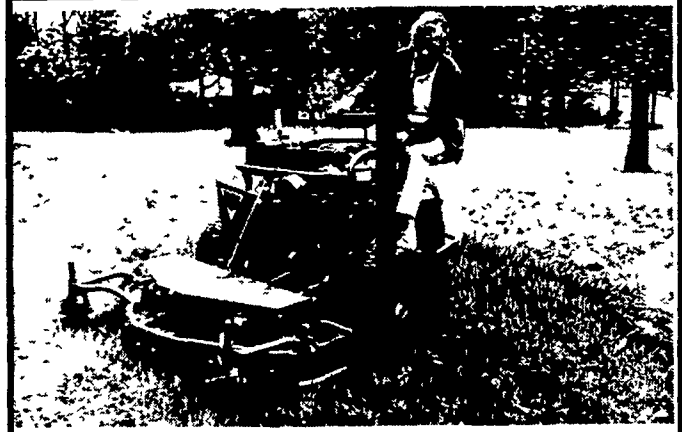

Homeowners cut mowing time in half with commercial rider
