

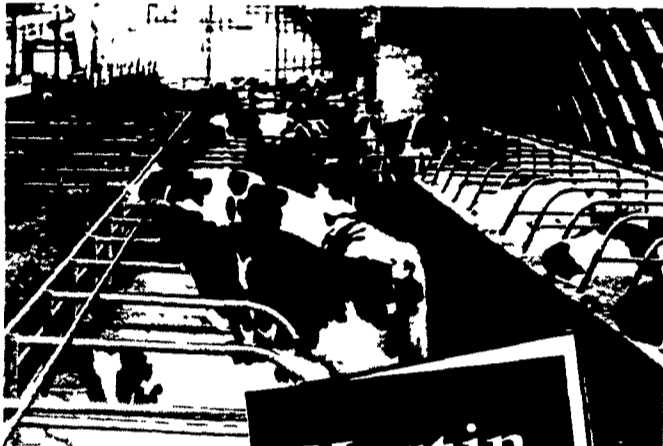
Farm Women Societies

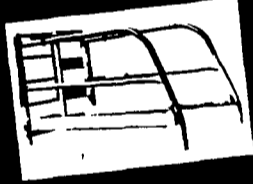

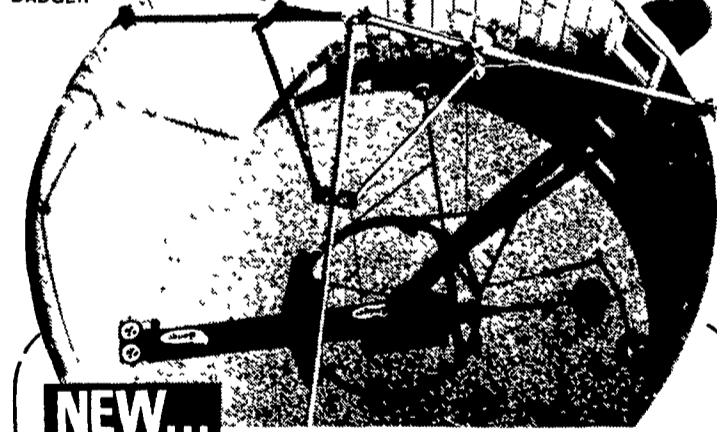
