Lathco flat pea is a new legume particularly adapted for ground cover to control soil erosion.

Similarly, red clover plots harvested at different periods in the late summer and early fall during the seeding year will be seen. These plots demonstrate that hay yields can be increased by over 1 ton per acre by using a pre-emergence chemical and early August clipping during the seeding year.

A new warm season perennial grass commonly grown in U.S. western range country, switchgrass, will be seen in comparison with such cool season grasses as timothy, orchardgrass, smooth bromegrass, and tall fescue.
