## **Lincoln Laid Groundwork** For Agriculture's Future

the spreading ravages of the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln placed important emphasis on the future of American agriculture

In one year, 1862, the Lincoln Administration took three separate actions which would have major long-range effects on the agricultural needs of a growing nation

Living up to the bargain he made for western support to get elected, Lincoln signed three agriculture related acts

- The U.S. Department of Agriculture was organized and given independent status to promote the nation's farming

-The Homestead Act was passed and agricultural development of the West entered

- Agricultural education received a much needed boost with the passage of the Morrill Land Grant College



In his first message to Congress President Lincoln called for the establishment of an agricultural and statistical bureau and on May 15 1862 the U S Department of Agriculture was created

Actually since the founding of the country in 1776 efforts had been under way to form such a federal body. In his

Although preoccupied with last annual message to Congress, George Washington ad vocated the creation of a board of agriculture

Benjamin Pranklin, Follow ed by Thomas Jefferson and others, started the practice of smuggling seeds back home from foreign countries Later, all US consuls in foreign lands were enlisted in these collection efforts

The first agricultural division was created under the Commissioner of Patents and the distribution of seeds to leading farmers was started Shortly before the Agriculture Department was created, the country even had an experimental federal five acre garden plot in Washington

On July 2 1862, the Land Grant College Act was passed and agriculture education was launched on a national basis These early education efforts were beset with many prob lems, but progress was made By 1892, organized college extension teaching in agriculture was begun

Agricultural which began under local societies, such as the Philadelphia Society for the Promotion of Agriculture in 1785, was put on a tormal and continuing basis

On May 20, 1862. President Lincoln signed the Homestead Act Now supposedly heads of families could receive 160 acres of the public domain Many problems and scandals concerning land development resulted in numerous changes in the law in coming years But gradual settlement and agricultural development moved westward

Thus within a scant month and a half back in 1862 Lincoln with three strokes of his presidential pen shaped the future of American agri


