Pickling problems discussed

Although food markets offer a wide variety of pickles and relishes, many homemakers today gain satisfaction from making their own pickles when garden vegetables and fresh fruits are in good supply.

Marceil A. Seckman, Ass't Ext. Home Economist in York County, says that pickling is a delightful art that well repays the time and care you must take for success.

The Cooperative Extension Service is offering a workshop on pickle making on August 7, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the 4-H Center near Bair Station. This workshop is open to anyone regardless of sex, race, color, or national origin. To register for the class call the Cooperative Extension Office at 848-3301 Ext. 276.

Models come 12 or 24 feet wide (24-foot model shown here), in lengths of 32 or 50 feet. All 24-foot wide buildings have an entry door in each end. See chart on back of this sheet for more specifications.

Built-in ventilation system keeps building dry and provides fresh air for animal health. Unique air flow system pulls air in at roof ridge line, circulates it over the top of the animals, through the pit, and out. Note that design of roof system eliminates the need for any massive bulkheads that could restrict air flow.

Farrowing stalls and nursery areas are equipped with aluminum T-slats in the floor, front and rear. Individual slats are 1" across the top and 1" high, with 3/8" spacing between slats.

Each farrowing stall has an adjustable sow feeder and automatic water cup. Nipple water is optional in place of water cup. Stall sides are adjustable to size of sow. Nursery feeders are provided for pigs.
