Stoltzfus elected news reporter

ELVERSON — Robert Stoltzfus, the 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Houck, Elverson R2, was recently selected as the Reporter for the State FFA organization. Robert's appointment to the state office is the fourth of such for the Twin Valley High School.

The Berks County youth was an active FFA'er at Twin Valley for four years taking hog fattening as his main project. "We always had hogs and beef around the home farm," Robert commented, "so when I went into FFA work I decided to take hog fattening as I was familiar with the work involved."

Active in FFA since his greenhand year in 1971, Robert has participated in the Berks County Swine Show and sale and was a livestock judge at both the Kutztown Fair and FFA activities week at Penn State. In his sophomore year, Robert served his chapter as sentinel while competing in the public speaking competitions and the swine show and sale.

In his junior year as an FFA'er, Robert was elected vice-president of the chapter and as the chairman of the Building Our American Communities he arranged for and coordinated a water testing program for chapter

members in conjunction with the Chester County Board of Health.

Robert was elected president of the local organization during his

senior year and also served as the county treasurer. An accomplished tractor driver, the youth placed first in the competition at the Kutztown Fair and also at the regional FFA tractor driving contest.

Along with his other duties, Robert also was chosen as the county star farmer and received his Keystone Degree at the Midwinter convention.

Commenting on his selection as a state officer, Robert shared his views by stating, "I'm glad I have the chance to represent FFA at various meetings that will be coming up in the fall."

"As a State officer, I will have to give a challenge to other FFA members to see the worth in joining the organization."

Robert will be responsible for four counties in the eastern portion of Pa. which will include visiting some 25 schools.

As the state reporter, Robert will have the duties of keeping the state scrapbook and publicizing FFA through various publications.

"I hope to have more articles in publications about our activities," the Berks youth stated.

Being elected a state officer was not novel to Robert's family, as his brother Frank served as the State-wide vice president in 1972-73.

Along with his new duties, Robert will be continuing the farming career he began following his graduation this spring.

"I plan to continue my hog operation," he commented, "and also I bought a combine which I plan to use for custom harvesting."

Although graduated from the chapter FFA, Robert will be continuing his membership by visiting the various schools in his area.
