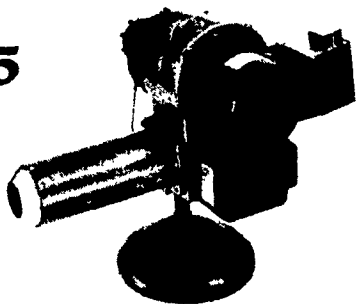

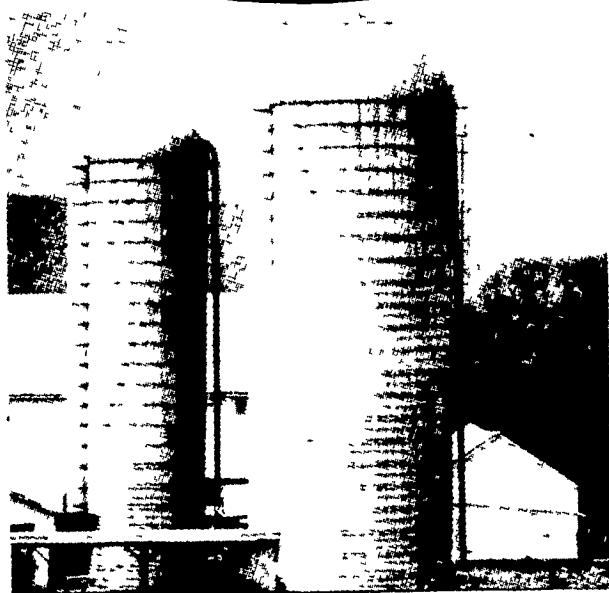

Stave Chutes, 2" Redwood Hinged Doors

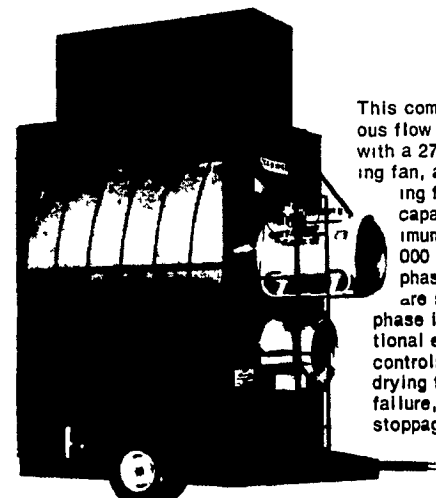
