

# Record price set at Lebanon show

Record prices were set in the 4-H market hog sale last Saturday climaxing the annual Lebanon Area Fair activities. John A. Granger of Granger's Provisions, Annville, purchased the Grand Champion, 214 pound, Hampshire hog owned by Charles Aungst, RD3, Annville R5 for \$2.25 per hundred weight.

Krall K. Hostetter, Host Acres Quality Meats, RD1, Lebanon bought the Reserve Grand Champion, a 220 pound Spotted Poland China

owned by Elaine Houser, RD5, Lebanon. The purchase price was \$1.59 per hundred weight.

A total of 79 market hogs weighing 17,163 pounds were sold for \$11,501.70 for an average of \$67.01 per hundred weight. Excluding the champions, the sale average was \$63.78 per hundred weight.

"Sex is a Family Subject" will be the topic of a talk by well known research associates and authors, Dr. William H. Masters and Virginia E. Johnson. The co-directors of the Reproductive Biology Research Foundation, Masters and Johnson will be part of an all-day seminar, Women in a Contemporary Society, scheduled for Thursday, October 9, 1975 at the Hershey Convention Center.

## Hunter resolution adopted

At the August 13 meeting of the Berks County Soil and Water Conservation meeting the directors adopted a resolution proposed and adopted at the May 17, 1975 Executive Council session of the Pennsylvania Association of Conservation District Directors. The resolution applies to hunting and reads as follows:

Whereas: Hunting is as old as man himself.

Whereas: Hunting has proved to be a valuable and necessary tool in wildlife management.

Whereas: Damage to agricultural and forestry crops would increase tremendously as a result of curtailment of hunting.

Whereas: Untold millions of hours of recreation are derived from hunting.

Whereas: There is a rapid growth in anti-hunting sentiment and in propaganda being disseminated by the various

media and other groups.

Whereas: The funds for wildlife management for most wildlife species are derived from the sale of licenses.

Whereas: Hunters have promoted and requested many of the leading Conservation laws and measures.

Whereas: Hunting and hunters contribute a great deal to the economy, particularly in less populated areas of the Commonwealth.

Whereas: Hunting reduces the wasteful slaughter of animals on the highways.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Pennsylvania Association of Conservation District Directors, Inc. go on record as being in favor of sport hunting and in opposition to any legislation or movement to curtail or abolish this valuable and ecologically sound wildlife management tool.
