Featured at the dedication was John Hoffman, former owner of the Lancaster Bone Fertilizer Company and resident of Quarryville. He presented a check to the fair association and community to pay for a large portion of the costs of the main exhibit hall. The shell of the building was dedicated to the memory of his late wife,

Sara Fuhrman Hoffman. Mayor James Ferguson accepted the check on behalf of Quarryville Borough, while Ken Rutt accepted on behalf of the fair association. A representative from Paul Risk Associates, who served as engineers for construction, was on hand to present a plaque for the building.

The buildings had been formally opened last Sunday during open house ceremonies with more than 200 people in attendance.
