

NASDA elects McHale

HARRISBURG Members of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture (NASDA), at their 57th annual convention Oct. 5-9 at Charleston, W. Va., elected Pennsylvania Agriculture Secretary Jim McHale as first vice-president,

L. D. McCorkindale, Arizona's Commissioner of Agriculture, first vicepresident for the past year, was named NASDA president.

Other officers elected were John M. Stackhouse, Ohio's Director of Agriculture, second vice-president; and S. Mason Carbaugh, Virginia's Commissioner of Agriculture, reelected secretary-treasurer. McCorkindale succeeds

West Virginia Agriculture Commissioner Gus R.

Douglass as president of NASDA.

In accepting the post of first vice-president, McHale relinquished the presidency of the Northeast Association of State Departments of Agriculture (NEASDA), a post to which he was elected at the annual meeting of the 10-state organization in July. John S. Dyson, New York Agriculture Commissioner, assumed the presidency of NEASDA.

As an officer of NASDA, McHale also serves on that organization's board of directors.

NASDA supports an office at Washington, D.C., headed by Executive Secretary William S. Cath, which serves as a liaison between the states and the federal government on matters of agricultural legislation and administration.
