

# US-Soviet grain deal displeases Farm Bureau

**PARK RIDGE** - The initialing of the U.S. - Soviet grain agreement formalizes a breach of faith with American farmers and ranchers by the Ford Administration, William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, said here today. "The Soviet agreement, announced by President Ford today, establishes a dangerous precedent for future political international commodity agreements, and constitutes further interference with the market

system in world markets," the national farm leader said. "I believe that the Soviet agreement, as far as farmers and ranchers are concerned, formalizes the breach of faith resulting from the default of the President in his promise at planting time of unfettered access to world markets. "The initialing of the Soviet agreement formalizes that breach of faith as the agreement marks an apparent trend toward government domination of

international trade in agricultural commodities. It is a precedent for other and more serious restrictive controls on farm exports. "Government - to - government trading is wrong in principle as it means sharing world markets on the basis of political determination.

"The sell out of the Ford Administration to the AFL-CIO and maritime unions is represented in the higher rates to be paid on Soviet grain export shipments in the maritime agreement.

"The State Department has used farmers as political pawns in its diplomatic game through its manipulation of the marketing of agricultural commodities.

"Farmers and ranchers should not be misled into believing the U.S. - Soviet oil agreement provides any real solution to the energy crisis. The Russian oil imports in the agreement are only a drop in the bucket in our overall imports and are largely cosmetic to make the

agreement seem attractive to farmers and the American public. "Foreign exchange earned by billions of dollars of U.S. agricultural exports has been a major contribution in paying for the soaring costs of oil imports," Kuhfuss said.

**English Program**  
Regarding the English Second Language program, Dr. Winger told the Board that there are now seven Vietnamese children in grades one through 12, one in kindergarten, and one Ugandan child and one Korean child in kindergarten, none of whom are fluent in English. He also said there "probably will be more to come."

Under state law, a school district must provide a special English program for any child not fluent in the language. Last year the district spent approximately \$3400 on this program and had budgeted the same amount for this year, before the influx of Viet families at the Gap.

Dr. Winger said that the program could be acquired through Intermediate Unit 13, which would send a teacher into the district, at a cost of about \$5,000. The Board authorized Dr. Winger to go ahead with the IU 13 program.

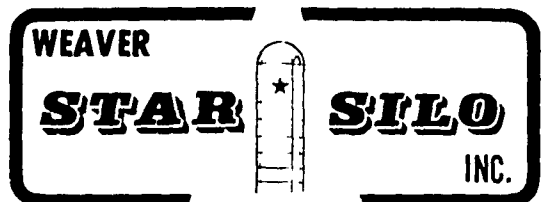
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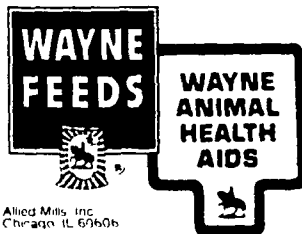


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
