

# Poultry production declines

HARRISBURGH - Pennsylvania poultry production for the week ending November 15, decreased 24 percent from the previous week and 23 percent from the same period last year, according to the Crop **Reporting Service.** 

Placements of broiler chicks in the commonwealth were 971,000.

Average placementsduring the past 10 weeks were eight percent above a year earlier.

In the 21 key poultry producing states placements were 57,066,000. This represents an increase of eight percent above last week and 10 percent above the same week a year ago. Average placements in the 21 key states during the past 10 weeks were 13 percent above a year ago.
