UNIVERSITY PARK - A bargain in costs of research was reported recently at Penn State University Research in agriculture at Penn State costs each citizen of the Commonwealth about 64 cents a year, stated Dr James M Beattie, Dean of the College of Agriculture, during the November meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Beattie described what he termed "significant benefits of research" His list in-cluded control of plant and animal diseases as well as development of new varieties of food crops for humans and feed crops for livestock.

"There has been notable research at Penn State dealing with improved nutrition for livestock, better pest control measures, renovation of strip mine spoil banks, and improved usage and disposal of waste materials," he claimed.

Since 1911, he said, there have been over 140 new plant varieties introduced by scientists with the

In addition, "Science in Agriculture," the quarterly magazine of the Experiment Station, presents research findings in popular language. 


